S1 pupils took part in a numeracy relay race. This involved all S1 pupils getting into teams and competing against each other to see how many numeracy questions they could answer and how quickly they could do it. The picture below shows pupils hard at work answering questions. S1's also completed a project during the week on Famous Mathematician's, they researched a mathematician, produced a poster and gave a presentation to the rest of their class.

S2 pupils all took part in Sumdog. This is a computer program where pupils play games by answering numeracy questions.



During the week staff wore a badge with a numeracy question on it. All pupils could then enter the 'What Number Am I?' competition where they had to match teachers' names with answers. Congratulations to the winner Zoe Van Den Driesche.


Finally staff also took part in a round of 'Numeracy Ninja's'. This involves answering 30 numeracy questions in 5 minutes, if you get them all correct you are a black belt. Pupils in S1 and S2 regularly start lessons by doing Numeracy Ninja's so it was interesting for the pupils to see teachers having a go, the results have been displayed on the board shown in the photo below.

LEITH ACADEMY in China – October 2019

On October 8th a group of twenty-two pupils and four staff flew to Beijing from Edinburgh airport. All of us knew this was going to be an unforgettable experience where we learnt so much about the culture, the language, the history of the country. Most of us felt like celebrities there as so many people took photos of us. The memorable overnight train took us from the Great Wall, the Forbidden City, the Temple of Heaven, the Summer Palace in Beijing to the Terracotta Warriors, the Hot Springs and the cycle or walk around the City of Xian and back. The acrobatic and Kung Fu shows were breath-taking. And we ended our China trip on the bullet train taking us to an amazing time in Tianjin visiting our partner school Tianjin N°1 school where we had such a warm welcome. There we embraced mask painting, shadowing classes in our partner school. The evening with the local families in Tianjin was an incredibly fascinating experience. Obviously we saw the beautiful pandas in Beijing zoo. All of us found the food in the hotels, restaurants, school canteen, family homes excellent; not to mention the local delicacies that some of us ventured to try and the delicious Chinese tea ceremony. Numeracy and business skills were certainly put to the test in the shopping trip to the Pearl Market in Beijing. The trip took us to two of the Wonders of the World. On October 17th we landed back in Edinburgh with new friends and many stories to share. We are very grateful to the very kind people who let us have this trip of a lifetime. 














China Trip—October 2019








SCEN youth summit November 8th

Mental Health Awareness Week


Our Mental Health Awareness Week in October focused on different ways in which our pupils could use self care and get their '5 A Day'. Each morning we looked at 5 main self care strategies- Rest and Relaxation, Being Kind, Connect with Others, Being Active and Be Yourself. Pupils took part in a range of activities throughout the week to demonstrate how they can self care using the 5 A day concept.

Activities such as yoga, mindfulness, arts and crafts, ukulele lessons, bracelet making, lunchtime sports clubs, board games, whole school mile walk n talk, photo booth, LGBTQ+ badge making and postcards and finishing with a 'Be Yourself' non uniform day were just some of the activities held during the week. The PE Department also ran a whole school inter-house for every pupil in each year group in basketball, football, rugby, capture the flag and dodgeball. Pupils were also issued a 5 A Day reward card. Over 140 pupils handed in their completed cards at the end of the week, demonstrating they had actively been using the self care strategies suggested and getting their cards signed by their teachers, staff members or prefects. The cards were put into a prize draw and our lucky winner Khadija Sharif (S3) won a cinema voucher and other healthy goodies. We will issue the cards again in February and re-run the fun to try and get more entries and bigger prizes as we continue to raise awareness on support our own and other's mental well-being.













Mental Health School Award

Leith Academy has just began its journey to strive for the Centre of Excellence for Mental Health in Schools Award, in partnership with Leeds Beckett University. Through undertaking this award we will be working very closely with pupils, staff parents and partners in order to increase the awareness of Mental Health and improve self-confidence, resilience and emotional intelligence for all of our young people. We have also introduced a Mental Health and Wellbeing qualification at National 4 and 5 level for a group of senior pupils.

We are also in the first stages of creating a s4-6 Mental Health Awareness Group. This learner participation group will aim to investigate strategies and support in school that can be advertised to and used by all senior pupils and staff so we are all working together to support each other's mental wellbeing. The main aim will be to have these strategies put in place by Feb 2020 to support senior pupils in the build up to their final exams in May. We had our first meeting at the end of November to brainstorm our ideas. We are now going to meet every Thursday lunch time in Jan/Feb to create our strategies and advertise them to the school community.

MVP

In the last month 34 S4-S6 pupils have been trained as Mentors in Violence Prevention (MVP). MVP is a peer mentoring programme that gives our young people the chance to explore and challenge attitudes, beliefs and cultural norms that underpin bullying and negative behaviours in school. Pupils attended a two day training course at South Leith Parish Church. Training included group discussions, mental health, a session from our school police officer and leadership skills. Senior pupils have since taught two MVP lessons to all S1 and S2 pupils. MVP mentors addressed an active bystander approach teaching pupils that they have the ability to support and challenge their peers in a safe way. Congratulations to all MVP mentors, your contributions in training and delivery to younger pupils has been brilliant!

Visit from Silkeborg Gymnasium, Denmark

In September Leith Academy was pleased to host students and staff from Denmark. This was the second visit to Leith from Silkeborg Gymnasium which is Denmark's biggest post-16 college with approximately 1450 pupils. Across the two days, 57 students and 4 staff visited a variety of lessons culminating in Tuesday evening's Ceilidh and Haggis-tasting. This added to their experience of Scotland as some students were particularly interested in young Scots' views on topics such as the EU, Brexit and Scottish independence, and others visited the Roslin Institute. Here's just a taste of their feedback:

- We would first like to thank the entirety of Leith Academy for the exceptionally warm welcome and your outstanding hospitality. Leith Academy is a beautiful school and we are very fortunate to have had the opportunity to experience it for a day. We really enjoyed our stay in your beautiful city and our visit to Leith Academy! We liked learning about your culture, dancing and tasting your national dish "Haggis". It was an exciting experience!
- The whole school day was very educational and gave us a picture of how school in Scotland is like. It was interesting to see how the lessons work, and how it's different from here in Denmark. The concept of inclusion at your school was cool with people from around the world wow!
- We are used to a different teacher-student relationship, which is a little bit more relaxed in Denmark. Your teachers were more authorized with the use of titles "Mr" and "Mrs". We now have something to compare our own school day to which is actually quite interesting as we have never before been able to put our school into perspective. What surprised us the most was the use of iPads instead of computers. Also, it seemed like the school always provided pencils, calculators or iPads which is the student's own responsibility to bring in Denmark.
- Some of us attended a double journalism class planned especially for us. This worked astoundingly well. The class was comprised of a small number of students from Denmark and Scotland and it functioned as a dialogue between two cultures. This conversation turned out to be very interesting and informing for both parts, thus leading to a broader cultural understanding among the attendees and across nations. We talked about school, politics and activities as well as youth culture in general. The close and intimate forum lead to an honesty and openness which was greatly appreciated. We all agreed that this was our favorite part of the day.
- The best experience we had was the Ceilidh with your students. Besides being a lot of fun, it was also a learning experience for all of us as we got an insight into Scottish norms and customs even though it got pretty hot and sweaty. It was also pleasing to see how much the students from Leith Academy were enjoying it; this made it so much funnier to participate in. There was just a lot of joy that evening, and we were very tired and exhausted after the dancing.





Criminal Justice on the Agenda

AH Modern Studies pupils again enjoyed a very thought provoking and informative conference at George Watsons College. This year over 200 pupils from 17 schools across Scotland converged on GWC for a series of workshops and lectures.





There were representatives from the Procurator Fiscal's office, 'Navigator' a branch of the Violence Reduction Unit, Criminal Justice Scotland, Families Outside, Aid and Abet Scotland and Heavy Sound. As well as providing terrific exemplification of work in the field of criminal justice, the speakers also provided an excellent opportunity for pupils to ask questions and use primary research methods for their dissertations.



A highlight of the day was the lecture from lan Millar, PA for AH Modern Studies. The pupils gained invaluable insight into how to maximise their marks in the questions paper and what makes a great dissertation.





Pupils in the S4 Achieve class have been working hard to develop their own business in school. The pupils have established a fully equipped milkshake bar – Mooshakez - at Leith Academy, that has been providing hospitality services as a project aimed at improving pupils' employability. The pupils received a Prince's Trust Development Award to support them in getting started, and their business has went from strength to strength.

Through the project, pupils have all successfully undertaken training for the REHIS Elementary Food and Hygiene Certificate and are working through Prince's Trust Scottish Personal Development units in Enterprise and Customer Service at Level 5.

By establishing Mooshakez, pupils have regular opportunities to put their skills in to practice and develop the employability skills required to gain positive and sustained destinations post-school.





Leith Academy is the first school in Edinburgh to receive this award, and the official launch took place on Thursday 5th September, with officials from The Prince's Trust, Councillor Ian Perry and MSP Ben Macpherson in attendance. In addition to running Mooshakez every Thursday breaktime, the group have also run the business at the Prince's Trust Edinburgh centre for CEO Nick Stace, and at the S1 Settling-In Parents Evening.

Feedback from pupils, partners and staff has been overwhelmingly positive, with many commenting that the pupils involved are growing in confidence and conducting themselves more professionally each week. Mooshakez will continue to run in the new year and pupils are focusing on developing new flavours to meet customer demand.

Slavery Walking Tour

In the freedom of the bright sunshine it was hard to imagine how the slaves must have felt. We started of at St John's Churchyard, where the shadows from the past came over us a bit more—we even saw a rat! We saw the grave of Malvina Wells, who is the only known person who was born enslaved from birth in Edinburgh. I can't imagine not ever having known freedom, but perhaps to her, her life was free. Or perhaps she knew, that sadly she was always going to be at a disadvantage. She was born in Grenada, and moved to Edinburgh as a teenager. I wonder if she found the language hard, or was punished if she misunderstood the commands. She was a lady's maid, and may have had genuinely good relationship with the family she served since her grave reads "A faithful servant and friend", although few people had this luxury. While we were there, we were also horrified by some of the adverts for runaway slaves, and the threats that were made, and the fact that in their day the slaves' worth would be determined by the reward put up if they ran away. We saw the side that many wealthy investors saw of the slave trade when we walked down to see the sugar refineries on the Royal Mile. There were many jobs brought by the sugar business, but was it worth slavery? Of course not, although they would have disagreed. The profits Britain made of sugar and tobacco were huge, so they probably saw nothing wrong with making it. We also saw the former tobacco shop of James Gillespie of Spylaw. I was shocked that that was who James Gillispie's was named after, of course, though many wealthy merchants did invest in schools or hospitals. If it was me I definitely would have changed the name but I suppose having such a huge reminder of slavery reminds us that it can never happen again.

Higher Geography Fieldwork





In September, the Higher Geography class had two days out doing fieldwork to collect data for assignments. We completed our rural fieldwork with the Water of Leith Conservation Trust. We started at Harperrig Reservoir and moved downstream to Craiglockhart Dells and then to Stockbridge, measuring the river at each site. We measured the width, depth, bedload and velocity of the river at each location. On the other fieldtrip, we completed an urban transect, from Princes Street out to the Gyle, to gather data for an urban assignment. We used a number of useful geographical techniques, including environmental quality and traffic surveys, land use surveys using RICEPOTS and taking a decibel reading to measure noise pollution from traffic.









'Leith Languages Fair 2019


Leith Academy and the 4 primary schools in the cluster count with a multicultural student body where more than 50 different languages spoken. The 1+2 Leith Cluster team decided to organise a Languages Fair for primary 7 pupils with the aim to celebrate the linguistic diversity of our pupils. Pupils from Craigentinny, Hermitage Park, Leith primary and Lorne primary schools and their parents were invited to attend this event and experience short taster activities in different workshops. They also had a chance to listen to people with experience in life and in the world of work with languages. 160 primary 7 pupils, their parents and their teachers took part in a range of workshops led by some of our bilingual pupils and some guests: Dr Hazel Crichton for University of Glasgow, Valeriya Kolpakova from JP Morgan, Catherine Guiat from the French Institute, Xiaobin Wei, a Hanban teacher at Leith Academy and a former Leith Academy pupil, India Murray, who is currently studying Languages at Edinburgh University. Visiting Auschwitz gave me such a deeper comprehension of the Holocaust and the Second World War. I'm truly glad I went.


Formula 1 in Schools

Leith Academy's first Formula 1 in Schools team, Falcon Flow, have been working hard in Design and Technology since the summer holidays.

F1 in Schools is an international STEM competition in which groups of 6 students have to design and manufacture a miniature car from a foam model block using CAD/CAM design tools. The cars are powered by CO_2 cartridges and are attached to a track by a nylon wire. They are timed from the moment they are launched to when they pass the finish line by a computer.

The team are making great progress in their project, preparing for the Scottish final on the 21st of February. In addition to working on a wide range of ideas for their car, they have branded their team, are making their own uniforms, and have raised all money required to enter the competition themselves.

Green Plan It
