Every June since 2008, people from across the UK have celebrated Gypsy, Roma and Traveller History Month. Through celebration, education and raising awareness, Gypsy, Roma and Traveller History Month helps to tackle prejudice, challenge myths and to amplify the voices of Gypsies, Roma and Travellers in wid-

er society. During Gypsy, Roma and Traveller History Month, we celebrate the unique and diverse histories, cultures and languages of Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities in the UK and also the remarkable and immense contributions Gypsy, Roma and Traveller individuals and communities bring to wider society. At the time of writing the theme for 2022 is yet to be revealed so be sure to check back <u>here</u> for updates and resources.

The aims of the GRTHM are to:

- Promote knowledge of the Gypsy, Roma and Traveller History, Cultural and Heritage
- Disseminate information on positive Gypsy, Roma and Traveller contributions to British Society
- Heighten the confidence and awareness of Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people to their cultural heritage
- Celebrate Gypsy, Roma and Traveller culture and heritage

In the meantime, you may wish to explore the following resources to inspire you to include GRT history in the curriculum.

The rich and diverse histories of Gypsy, Roma and Traveller people are largely absent from classrooms, books and museums. <u>This</u> <u>timeline</u> gives a small glimpse into the international histories of Gypsies, Roma and Travellers. , including key dates in history for people

of Romany Gypsy, Irish Traveller, Roma and Scottish Gypsy Traveller ethnicities.


The Traveller Movement

website offers a wide range of resources for you to share with colleagues and learners and highlights current issues for GRT communities.




Did you know that Gypsies, Roma and Travellers are often categorised together under the 'Roma' definition in Europe and under the acronym 'GRT' in Britain?

These communities share some common characteristics: the importance of family/community, the history of nomadism, a tendency toward self-employment, and the experience of disadvantage.

Focus on Refugee Week 2022

20th - 26th June

The theme of <u>Refugee Week 2022</u> is Healing. Through creativity and conversations, Refugee Week 2022 will be a celebration of community, mutual care, and the human ability to start again. Refugee Week 2022 is 20– 26 June, and anyone can take part by holding or taking part in an event and activity. We would like to share with you some of the organisers' words to inspire you to honour this important week in your establishment.



Healing means recovering from a painful experience or situation, so that we can continue to live. Noone understands this better than those who have lost their homes and had to build new lives from scratch. We have much to learn from refugees about holding onto hope when going on seems impossible – as well as about how art, creativity and community can help us to heal. Those going through the asylum system also know that healing is an ongoing process, made harder by poverty, housing difficulties and the threat of being detained or deported. Asking for change, so that refugees can truly feel safe, is an act of care.

Whether it's about looking after ourselves and each other at difficult times, overcoming political divisions or coming together to fight for the survival of our shared planet, healing matters to all of us. Whoever and wherever you are, we hope you'll join us for Refugee Week 2022 to imagine a world where healing replaces harm, and care becomes our shared currency.

During Refugee week, you are invited to support the cause by undertaking <u>Simple Acts</u> everyday actions we can all do to stand with refugees and make new connections in our communities. Sharing Good Practice

Leith Academy Culture Day

Our vision of Culture Day came about because we felt that our school needed something new and unique to celebrate the diverse cultures of Leith Academy. We realized this would be a big commitment to take on, but with the support of both Mrs Duhaney and Mr Stewart, we managed to make the day one to remember! Due to the restrictions throughout the last two years, we felt the school needed something big to bring everyone together again which was why we decided to do Culture Day.

On the 10th of February, we hosted our first Culture Day meeting. There were 20 countries and areas that were going to be represented on the day: Punjab, Nepal, Nigeria, Zimbabwe, Senegal, Ethiopia, Gambia, Ken-

ya, Pakistan, China, Sudan, Scotland, Hong Kong, Poland, Venezuela, Brazil, Catalonia, Morocco, Palestine, Syria, Sweden and France. Representatives of these countries took part in planning their own area, with dancing, singing, music, food and crafts.

Meetings held in the run up to Culture Day covered the planning and organization. This included things such as arranging the food, the music, activities and decorations. As two seventeenyear-olds we found it challenging to run the meetings as talking to large groups of people is



intimidating, but we managed to persevere through it. The run up was very stressful and at some points we felt like giving up, but we remembered the bigger picture and the legacy we wanted to leave at Leith Academy.

Thursday 10th March was our final meeting and the day we prepared our food in school, decorated the halls and set up our stations. We had massive support from Bev and Mrs Ralston of the Home Economics Department, who helped accommodate the cooking after school. Some parents/guardians also came in and contributed to preparation of the various dishes. The pressure was massive but both Bev and Mrs Ralston managed to make it work. Having the children cooking together was a lovely sight to see.

Friday 11th March was Culture Day. The day brought an atmosphere to Leith Academy that no one had experienced before. There were people dressed in their cultural clothing, music from different countries and dancing and singing that included everyone and made students and teachers really come out of their shells and get involved. Culture Day was important to celebrate because it brought students and staff closer to each other's traditions and cultural differences. The day gave everyone a chance to develop respect and understanding for those cultures; celebrating our differences as well as our common aspects helped us unite and educate one another.

Broughton Primary School

Languages Display

We were curious to know how many languages were spoken by the children and families at Broughton. So, we sent out a letter to all our families to ask them to reply with all the different languages spoken at home. We used the returns to make a list and decided that we'd like to show our results in the form of a display for the school. We wanted to show where in the world these languages were spoken and wanted to find out how to say 'Hello' in each one. One of our pupils in our Enhanced Support Base is great at drawing maps from memory, so he drew our World Map, and we researched all the ways to say 'Hello.' We decided to



call it 'Amazing Languages We Speak!' The display is at the entrance to our school, so it's the first thing people see when they visit. New families have commented how nice it is to see different languages represented. We are very proud of it.

Equalities Calendar

We wanted to have a way of showing when important equalities events were happening in school so we didn't forget them. We also intended that we could use some of the events as ideas to discuss in assembly. We wanted to included religious and cultural events, gender equality days, LGBTQ+ days and other celebrations. We researched a range of events for the year and planned which were the most important to include in our calendar. Each month we add these events to our calendar, and we sometimes decorate the labels so they look bright and colourful. Some of our classes pass by the calendar as they come in and out of school, and they often comment on the events as they pass by.

It was a fantastic day, with pupils clearly enjoying being out in the fresh air and sunshine whilst showing solidarity and support for the LGBT+ Community.



The website invites you to learn from the <u>lived experiences</u> of people with autism as the best way to learn more about autism is to listen to autistic people themselves, whilst acknowledging that no two experiences are the same. Each and every individual experiences the world in a way that is unique to them but there are some common questions asked about autism and Different Minds answers them <u>here</u>.




A Drama in Time

A Drama in Time is a visual poetry resource by poet and performer Courtney Stoddart, A Scottish-Caribbean poet and performer whose work focuses on racism, imperialism and growing up in Scotland. Stoddart has created a series of creative writing activities supporting learners to explore the lesser discussed parts of renowned poet Robert Burns' life and to use their understanding of Edinburgh and thoughts on identity to imagine the future, by creating a visual poem. The resource is suitable for secondary school pupils in Edinburgh schools and could be used in Art and Design, History, Modern Studies, English or Interdisciplinary Learning.

We have uploaded the resource to the <u>Equalities</u> <u>Tile</u> and you can also find it <u>here</u>, along with key information for teachers.

The activities have been inspired by Graham Fagen's artwork <u>A Drama in Time</u>, and the quote the artwork takes its title from, by Edinburgh city planner Patrick Geddes (1854-1932) – "a city is more than a place in space, it is a drama in time". The artwork and its title invite us to think of the people, sites and events which create the city's sense of place: past, present, and future.
