#### Stormzy

Stormzy is a British, man of Ghanaian origin, who's widely known for his influence in the entertainment industry. unique rapping, singing and song-writing skills have gained accreditations such as MOBO Awards, Best Grime artist 2014 and the Best Album of the Year in 2018 at the Brits Awards. beginning His humble greatly influenced his work. From being a young boy from Croydon, born to a Ghanaian mother and a taxi driver father, to now giving Scholarships to individuals from deprived backgrounds to go to Cambridge to further their studies, and even helping to fight racial inequalities well as as challenging political issues.

#### Afua Kyei

The highlight of her financial career is being shortlisted as the most influential Black British Person in the UK. in 2026. She was born in London and her parents are of Ghanaian origin. attended a private secondary school in Croydon, before furthering her studies in Chemistry at the Somerville college, Oxford. After which she worked as a junior researcher at Princeton University, going on to train as a chartered accountant at Ernest and Young. She was the CFO of the Bank of England from 2012 to 2019.

#### Jane Bolin

Jane Bolin made history in 1939 as the first black female judge in the United States. At a time when racism and sexism were widespread, she broke barriers with courage and determination.

Bolin was born in New York and became the first black woman to graduate from Yale law school. As a judge she advocated for equality, education and child welfare; making sure all children were treated fairly.

She was a beacon of strength and dedication to inspire black people, and women in general, to follow their dreams and to fight for justice

#### Introduction


